Switzerland has one of the most diverse cuisine in the world. Everyone is familiar with Fondue, Raclette and Zuercher Geschnetzeltes. These icons are almost as famous as the Matterhorn. But this land of four languages and four cultures has many other culinary delights to offer. From the Berner Platte with Roesti to the sausages of French-speaking Switzerland, From Engadine capuns (chard-wrapped dumplings) to Ticino's polenta with brasato, each region has its own, authentic specialties. Coming from Eastern Switzerland, the famous St. Galler Bratwurst is first on my mind. Switzerland is not only home to the finest traditional cuisine, it also produces magnificent wines and top quality spirits as Kirsch (cherry brandy), Williams (pear brandy) and Pfluemli (plum brandy). The wine growing tradition dates back millennia. Mass-produced wines exist rarely in Switzerland, the vineyards are too small. The wines are characterful and distinctive expressions of the landscape in which they originate.

Let's not forget the artistic creations of famous star chefs. Swiss chefs are sought after all over the world. No other place has such a density of gourmet restaurants as this multi-cultured nation.

To go on a culinary trip to Switzerland I can recommend "The Swiss Cookbook". It is the first cookbook in English of the well liked Betty Bossi cookbook series (www.bettybossi.ch).

Nationality Room Update

The SNRC is delighted to report that we are doing all we can to have the Swiss Room constructed at Pitt's Cathedral of Learning in 2011, with fabrication of many of the room's components commencing in 2010. What at one time seemed like an impossible climb is now within our collective grasp.

We will look back at the joyous time we spent around the picnic tables at the August 1 celebration this past summer at Richland Barn with fondness, because at that time were present Justin Ruessli (design architect/Lucerne), Stephen Altherr (local architect-of-record), Maxine Bruhns (Nationality Rooms Director), Dominique Schinabeck (CEO of Acutronic, our first corporate sponsor), Richard and Sarah Sink (designated woodcrafter extraordinaire), and our entire Room committee. This room may indeed be completed without all these personalities being present at one time ever again. The people who need to make the room come to fruition are now engaged to the full.

We are within striking distance of having all the funds necessary to initiate room construction (25% more needed in the next 12 months). An outreach to our top 40 donors since the August 1 event has raised \$15,675 in the past two months. More information on our total financial picture will be presented in a fall appeal mailing within the next month. We ARE close, and we are engaged with Pitt Facilities right now moving ahead with estimating our final numbers, and issuing contracts for the work once finished construction documents prepared by Stephen Altherr in collaboration with Richard Sink and Justin are completed. They expect construction documents to be finalized by January 2010. Acquisition and preparation of hardwoods may commence very soon after that to take advantage of low current hardwood costs.

And everything else is in place, many many parts in motion together (like a

Swiss watch) including:

Our room designer and renowned Swiss architect Justin Rüssli remains heavily involved with the project. The lighting engineering and design is being finalized between Justin and Stephen.

Stephen Altherr of EDGE Studio, a Swiss-American Society of Pittsburgh member and experienced architect on multiple Pitt projects, has been named the architect-of-record. Stephen and his staff are under formal contract from Pitt (approved by the SNRC), and they are finalizing meticulous construction drawings from Justin's room design. His role also includes the final project budget prep and delegation, supervised by Pitt Facilities Swiss Room contact Adrienne Spellone, of the contracts for the work issued from Pitt.

Master woodworker and carver Richard Sink (who lives near Helvetia, West Virginia, and has years of experience constructing Swiss furniture) has been our leading choice for creating all of the room's wood features since we became aware of his amazing abilities late last fall. Pitt Facilities has helped our efforts by allowing Stephen and Richard to work together preparing construction documents for the room. Richard has tirelessly sought all the detail work he needs to know to complete the chairs, tables, lectern, frames, benchwork, flooring, ceiling, walls, door and display case work for this project as a sole vendor. His estimates have encouraged our committee of our aggressive timetable's legitimacy. The SNRC as one mind are impressed by his deliberate and complete attention to detail, and we feel his unique artistic vision and multi-disciplinary excellence will help keep our project under tight cost control.

Richard's connections in the West Virginia crafts communities has pointed toward both a leaded stained glass craftsman for the room's distinctive windows, and a blacksmith possibility for the historic metalwork. Other local sources will also be tapped to compete for some of these sub-contracted items.

Pitt Facilities, chiefly their head Park Rankin and designated contact for our project Adrienne Spellone, have been fantastic with us-helping us move so efficiently with Stephen Altherr through the final design and estimate phase keeping our committee briefed of every development. Fred Carlson has attended 3 meetings at Pitt Facilities since August 1 where final options for the seating and arrangement of elements to enhance the student comfort in the room have been considered. An issue that was never addressed yet (lighting) is yielding wonderful options for merging high tech Swiss lighting within the rosettes design of a late medieval room! The best of past and present!

In addition, everyone on the SNRC continues to aggressively pursue new support for the Swiss Room. This includes:

Dominique Schinabeck, the CEO of Acutronic, a Swiss company in Pittsburgh, is assisting with an effort to obtain gift commitments from Swiss businesses in the region. Dominique has fulfilled a generous pledge to the project.

A Pittsburgh-based grant proposal writer, Tom Prendergast, has volunteered his time to research and solicit additional foundation support for the project.

Swiss Room supporters with deep connections in Switzerland are currently seeking a free or discounted antique Kachelofen.

The Swiss Room was recently profiled in the *Pittsburgh Post-Gazette* in conjunction with the G-20 meeting, and a reporter from Swiss Broadcasting and swissinfo.ch, Marie-Christine Bonzom, based in Washington DC, was in Pittsburgh last week writing about the room project and other Swiss community news for the Swiss back home.

Winter Recipe – CHEESE FONDUE

Do you have a fondue pot? Interested in making homemade Swiss cheese fondue to warm you up this winter? Here is a family recipe from Michael Müilly:

Ingredients:

Bread

800g=1.75 lb **mixed Swiss cheeses** (e.g. Gruyere, Appenzeller, Vacherin, Tilsiter).

3dl = 1.25 cup **dry White wine**

1/4 lemon

1-2 cloves of **garlic**

2-3 teaspoons of **cornstarch**

Nutmeg, Pepper, 1.5-2.5 tbsp Kirsch

Instructions:

Rub the fondue pot with garlic and add the cheese. Add cornstarch and mix. Add the wine, squeeze the lemon over the cheese. Cook slowly, making figure 8's with a wooden spoon (not too forcefully or too quickly!) until it is cooked (melted to proper thickness). Then add nutmeg, pepper, and other favorite spices, and Kirsch. Transfer the fondue pot to its stand, dip the bread and enjoy!
