## Swiss Nationality Room Committee Report

Due to the creativity and fundraising experience of Philip Bottonari, and the communication zeal of our new Swiss Honorary Consul and first corporate donor, Dominique Schinabeck, our Swiss Committee has been busy locating and submitting large donor asks directly to some prospects we feel can help us conclude our Swiss Room fundraising this calendar year. Our donor community will notice we did not issue a spring appeal this year since we were busy with assembling the materials to make the major requests. We hope to report success of this endeavor at the August 1 celebration.

Please continue to be as generous as possible with your giving for this project! This is the time to make your mark on this important project symbolic of Swiss fraternity and heritage; a project that will be maintained by U. of Pittsburgh in perpetuity.

We continue to press for May-November 2011 construction transforming the U. of Pittsburgh's room 321 into the beautiful and historic Swiss Room. At our Swiss Night event in March, I led our historic expert Evelyn Ruffing in a series of questions and answers about why this room is so unique with its late Medieval architecture. Architect-of-record Stephen Altherr has completed 95% design documents which are being let for bids at this time for the contracting work. By press time, contracts will have been engaged with prime artisan Richard Sink of the French Creek/Helvetia, West Virginia area to construct the furniture. Since last September 2009, Stephen, Philip (when his schedule permits) and myself have been through a series of meetings at Pitt Facilities to present and revise the engineering requirements and the complete design plan for the room, always keeping our budget in focus. These discussions have been chaired by Pitt Facilities Project Manager Adrienne Spellone, and have been attended by E. Maxine Bruhns, Ph.D., the Nationality Rooms Director, and her staff member Eileen Kiley, along with Pitt registrar Sam Conte and other engineering representatives of the University.

On Wednesday May 26, the Swiss Room Committee (Dr. Heinz W. Kunz/ Chairman, Philip Bottonari, Fred Carlson/Vice-Chairman-Secretary, Nancy Flury Carlson, Dominique Schinabeck, Evelyn Ruffing, along with E. Maxine Bruhns,

Stephen Altherr, and Eileen Kiley) hosted our special guests: Christoph & Regula Bubb, the Swiss General Consul/NYC and his wife, at the University's Braun Room on the 12<sup>th</sup> Floor of the Cathedral of Learning.

Coincidentally, it was exactly two years ago that the Ambassador had visited the Nationality Rooms and had generously given to fund the last chair in the auction we were sponsoring that year. He gave of his personal funds to buy the Fribourg chair. We reflected that we were happy that even as Dr. Kunz had to end his tenure as Swiss Honorary Consul, that Dominique Schinabeck was able to say 'yes' to this honor and the position is in capable hands for the future, with good continued good prospects for the Swiss Room with this relationship intact.

We briefly updated the Ambassador with the progress of the past 2 years, including locating Richard Sink as woodcrafter endorsed by project design architect Justin Ruessli, our subsequent visit and communications with Richard and his amazing facility, fundraising progress, and the presentation of the 16-page final construction documents was led by architect-of-record Stephen Altherr.

I mentioned to the Bubbs that our friend and donor Ed Graf is researching Red Clay Tile in Bellevue as a possible source of a re-created kachelofen if we do not locate a donated or inexpensive antique. Christoph Bubb further elaborated on his desire to help Philip and Dominique with our major gift asks and is willing to be at private meetings in the NYC area that may be coming up in the next two months. Maxine then brought the Bubbs and SNRC attendees on a brief room tour of the 3<sup>rd</sup> floor highlights-the ones right around the future Swiss Nationality Room (321)!

## Pittsburgh Folk Festival 2010 - Report

Pittsburgh Folk Festival held May 14-16 at the new Monroeville Convention Center was a success! In keeping with this year's theme for cultural displays, we recreated a Christkind Markt booth as the central focus of the exhibit. As in the past, the performance of the Swiss Singers was well received.

The only negative note is that next year we need to do a better job with advanced ticket sales. We were the second lowest of 23 groups in tickets sold; moreover, 7 groups with memberships our size or smaller sold 2.5 to 7 times as many as we did. One redeeming factor is that one of our members donated ethnic items for the Festival to sell, raising approximately \$300.

The display of plans for the Swiss Nationality Room generated a good deal of interest especially when people learned that we are getting close to construction. We are definitely creating a level of anticipation among the general public.

## Gallatin Event – Report

Well-educated Swiss orphan with aristocratic heritage sneaks away to the U.S. to make his fortune. Along the way he finds himself losing money in some of his capital ventures, making money on others, eloping with his first bride who dies in less than a year, having the dubious distinction of being the first Senator thrown out of Congress, losing money in some of his early capital ventures, building a house miles from nowhere and selling it at a huge loss, and becoming a vociferous proponent for democracy by arguing for passage of the Bill of Rights in order for the U.S. Constitution to be accepted. Where does young Albert Gallatin end up? As President Jefferson's Secretary of the Treasury, managing the financing of the Louisiana Purchase and the Lewis and Clark expedition. When the explorers came to a place where 3 rivers met (in Montana, NOT Pittsburgh), they named one river Jefferson, one Madison, and the third--GALLATIN!

Over a dozen SAS-P members touring the Friendship Hill National historic site of Gallatin's wilderness home found our June 12th visit informative and fascinating. Five family groups enjoyed picnics ahead of time in a shaded pavilion; we all enjoyed the tour and exhibit gift shop as well as the patio's view looking the river... It was especially nice to have new member Beatrice Hook join us for this outing. You might ask her at the picnic if she is still thinking of taking a school field trip there next year! We highly recommend the drive and tour to learn more about this Swiss American heritage of which most of us were pretty much unaware before our visit.

This was likely Mark and my last SAS-P event as Pennsylvania residents. We are moving to Maplewood, New Jersey. We hope to keep in touch and to return for the August 1 Picnic!!

## MEMBERSHIP SPOTLIGHT: Shirley Engel

Like many member of the Swiss American Society of Pittsburgh, I am of Swiss descent and discovered my "Swiss Roots" later in life and a lost connection to Canton Zurich.

I had inherited a number of family documents that included a *Heitschein* or Certificate of Family Origin/Residence. With the assistance of a professional Genealogist in Canton Zurich, I learned the importance of the place of citizenship in Switzerland and how it is handed down generation to generation.

My great, grandfather Theophile Frey was born Gottlieb Frei in 1825 in the town of Mönchaltorf, Canton Zurich. He was one of ten children and the son of a shoemaker. He lived at the family farm "Gut Rissli" which dates back to the early 1600's. With the help of his older brother, he left Mönchaltorf as a boy and traveled to Paris, France. There he changed his name to the French Theophile Frey and became an accomplished gilder and porcelain painter.

He was briefly involved in the 1848 Revolution sweeping Europe, following the German revolutionary poet Georg Herwegh from Paris to Germany. The armed revolt failed and Theophile lived briefly in exile in Solothurn, Switzerland and then Besancon, France where he met his wife Melanie Frey née Soret.

Theophile's talent of decorating and applying gold to porcelain was recognized by a prominent New York City retailer: E.V. Haughwout during a trip to France and the couple was able to secure both employment and passage to New York City. My grandmother was born in 1853 and named *Helvina* in remembrance of Switzerland. The family's story followed the Decorative Arts movement in the United States and the changing demands from hand decorated porcelain to mass produced goods after the Civil War. Several American pieces in museums like the "Lotus Leaf" pitcher below from Yale University Art Gallery are attributed to Theophile Frey.

My great, grandfather Theophile died in 1871 and my grandmother Helvina, married by

the name of Wilpert Weid in Trenton, New Jersey. Wilpert Weid had also learned the art of gilding.

The Weyds (Weid) line dates back to the 1600's and is originally from the village of Holtzhausen in the Grand Duchy of Hessen, near present-day Frankfurt, Germany. Possibly due to the German Democratic Revolution, my great grandfather Caspar Weid, a shoemaker, emigrated to Switzerland. In 1850 he married Maria Baumann from Dürnten, Canton Zurich. Dürnten is also a place of citizenship for the Freys-- Maybe the families knew each other!

Two births in Dürnten-my great aunt Maria Barbara Weid in 1851 and my grandfather Ulrich Wilpert Weid in 1853 are recorded in Switzerland. The Weids emigrated from Switzerland to New York City in 1858 and lived for ten years in the Lower East End of Manhattan, in "*Kleiner Deutschland*". Both parents died in 1868, leaving the children orphans. My grandparents Helvina and Wilpert married in 1874 and had eight children including my father Theodore.

My reminiscences of Swiss family traditions are unfortunately few. My grandmother Helvina was known for her cooking and also the ability to produce fruit brandies. Several oil paintings of Swiss landscapes by great, grandfather Theophile Frey remain in the family as well as gilded porcelain pieces. Another connection to Switzerland Theodore, my father, was named after Theophile (God-Beloved).

Passport records indicate, my great aunt Maria Baumgartel née Weid traveled to Dürnten in the early 1900's with her husband, a musician with the Metropolitan Opera of New York. Sadly, she passed away while attending with her husband the 1911 US premier of Ludwig Thuille's opera "Lobetanz" -named after the traditional 16th century Swiss dance.

Bernadette Grob, the professional Genealogist I mentioned found my extended family in the Zurich State Archives, dating back to the 1600's. I highly recommend her services to members of German/Swiss ancestry:

## **New Honorary Consul of Switzerland to Pittsburgh and Western District of Pennsylvania:**

I was born in Boston MA into an international family enriched with both culture and business knowledge. My mother half American with a strong Italian heritage was an Opera Singer who toured Europe, my Father born of German decent an entrepreneur running his own business. Since I spent most of my life in Zug, Switzerland I became a Swiss Citizen in 1993 thus I have dual citizenship Swiss/American. In 2006 I moved from Switzerland to Pittsburgh to take the position of Chairwoman & CEO of Acutronic USA Inc., an additional benefit of this position narrowed the miles to my Mother and Brother both living in Boston, MA. I have a young daughter of 16 months of age Annabella born in Pittsburgh. She is my sweet heart, the light of my life. Annabelle's father Werner Welti is Swiss and lives in Zurich Switzerland.

Since my arrival in Pittsburgh, I am acting as Chairman and CEO of Acutronic USA Inc, and have joined and networked with many local organizations. I am on the BoD of Catalyst Connection, an economic development organization, whose mission is to advance the performance of manufacturing companies in Southwestern Pennsylvania. I am also on the Advisory Board of the Federal Reserve of Cleveland. Early this year, I was appointed by Consul General Christoph Bubb, Honorary Consul of Switzerland to Pittsburgh.

As honorary consul to Switzerland, it is my mission to "put Switzerland on the map" and increase the awareness of Switzerland to Pittsburgh and Western Pennsylvania. Also, to assist Swiss nationals and individuals traveling to Switzerland to enlighten them on issues about and around Switzerland.

To reach this target, two events are planned this year: First the visit of Consul General Bubb to Pittsburgh in May. Secondly, an event that I plan to organize together with the Allegheny Conference in Pittsburgh aiming at building and strengthening the bridge between Switzerland and the Pittsburgh Regional District. The agenda will focus on Green Energy, Innovation and Education best practices

Additionally, I am supporting the SWISS National Room Project as a committee member to raise enough funds to start the project in 2010!

I look forward to many fruitful discussions with all the members of SAS!

## **Visit of Ambassador Christoph Bubb to Pittsburgh May 25th through 26th 2010**

Ambassador Christoph Bubb and his wife Regula held a reception at the Duquesne Club on May 25<sup>th</sup> 2010 to introduce Dominique E Schinabeck in her new role as Honorary Consul of Switzerland to Pittsburgh and Western Pennsylvania. Present were Honorary Consuls of other countries, members of the Swiss American Society as well as representatives from the city's cultural, business and political arenas.

Prior to the reception, Christoph took the time to meet with various members of the Swiss American Society (SAS) to learn about their personal backgrounds and relationship to Switzerland as well to learn more about SAS's activities. He was very impressed about our activities and that SAS has an active "Männerchor".

The following day, a series of meetings were held with representatives of local organizations including the Allegheny Conference and the Pittsburgh Chamber of Commerce. We exchanged information on Swiss companies doing business in Pennsylvania as well as Pennsylvanian companies with offices in Switzerland.

A meeting was also held with Professor Ed Schlesinger, Dean of Electrical Engineering and Computer Science. The discussion included insights into the established exchange program with Lausanne's EPFL (Ecole Polytechnique Fédérale de Lausanne) and CMU (Carnegie Mellon University). Every year approximately five exchange students take the opportunity to spend a semester abroad in Switzerland and vice versa.

A meeting with the Swiss National Room Committee was scheduled to show the progress of the project and to discuss further fundraising actions. This was followed by a tour of the existing Nationality Rooms at the Cathedral of Learning.

The day ended with a private tour through the Carnegie Mellon Museum.

The visit gave Ambassador Christoph Bubb and his wife Regula an interesting overview of Pittsburgh's culture, business and political climate.

It was a pleasure to host Ambassador Christoph Bubb and his wife and I look forward to many future events to support the mission to "put Switzerland on the map" and increase the awareness of Switzerland to Pittsburgh and Western Pennsylvania.

## Council of the Swiss Abroad – Report

The Council of the Swiss Abroad is a 140 member legislative body of the Organization of the Swiss Abroad, the Swiss Government's recognized representative of all Swiss abroad and Swiss clubs across the globe and publisher of the Swiss Review. In 1966, this group achieved the inclusion of the rights of Swiss abroad in the federal constitution (Article 40). In 1992, they facilitated the introduction of the right to vote on federal matters by mail. They have successfully defended the optional old-age insurance from dismantlement on many occasions. They also oversee the 17 Swiss schools abroad initiatives connecting young Swiss with their roots.

Approximately 54,000 registered Swiss live in the United States, represented by 8 members nominated by local Swiss clubs. Last year, with the support of the board of our Swiss society, I became a representative for a four year term. The council holds two yearly meetings.

The Council of Swiss Abroad is currently in the process of realizing several important projects. Swisscommunity is a website allowing the Swiss organizations across the globe to connect. It is a

project similar to SwissRoots, but global in scope, and focused on the involvement of individual members. It will allow Swiss clubs to maintain event calendars and club related information in one central place. I hope that this platform will increase our cooperation with other Swiss clubs in the US.

The other major project is the introduction of a federal law in Switzerland to concentrate all the governmental efforts targeted at Swiss abroad. As of now, each federal authority is independently responsible for offering appropriate services to Swiss abroad. The Federal Department of Home Affairs is responsible for the voluntary age insurance, the Federal Department of Finance for issues regarding taxation, the Federal Department of Foreign Affairs for registration, etc. The proposed law will unify this.

These main issues will be further explored at the next meeting of the Council of the Swiss Abroad on August 20<sup>th</sup> in St. Gallen. I will be in attendance at this meeting and hope to provide some input into these matters from the perspective of the US Swiss organizations. If you would like to discuss any of these items or have any suggestion, I would welcome you to contact me at any time.
