New York Consulate Has a New Deputy Consul

Pittsburgh and Western Pennsylvania is in Switzerland's New York consular district. The Consulate General in New York is headed by Ambassador Hans-Peter Erismann. Recently, he was joined by a new Deputy Consul, Mr. Erich Wirth. Mr. Wirth is the Head of the Commercial Section. He last served in Rabat in Morocco. His primary duties are to reply to all commercial inquiries from U.S. firms wishing to source products and services from Switzerland and to provide information about the Swiss economy, trade fairs, etc., conduct partner searches, assist visiting Swiss businessmen, and promote U.S. investments in Switzerland. Swiss News on the Radio

Like many other countries, Switzerland

maintains a radio news service for its compatriots and friends around the world. News, general information, commentary and entertainment is being broadcast every day of the week in several languages (including, naturally, English) over short wave bands at convenient times. If you are interested in what the Swiss think about international developments or what the latest news in Switzerland is, if you want to hear old and new music of Switzerland or if you want to practise your German, tune in! If you drop a note to Consul Heinz Kunz (412-621-1343) he will send you a brochure listing frequencies and times. A good short wave radio is available for about \$100 at specialized stores.

Planning a Trip to Switzerland?

With today's value of the dollar a trip to Switzerland is not inexpensive. Help is available, though, from a brochure recently issued by the Swiss Hotel Association. Under the title "Country Inns" it lists about 100 small hotels throughout Switzerland which are family owned and managed. Prices start at Sfr. 30 for bed and breakfast per night. Did You Know?

- that the Romans during their occupation of what later became Switzerland developed an extensive road system criss-crossing Switzerland? Many of these roads have been known continuously and are often named "Roemerweg" (Roman path). Others have been rediscovered only in recent times. Several crossed the Alps in various places, e.g. over the Septimer, Maloja, and Julier passes. In many places stone-paved roads with deep wheel ruts from extensive use can

be seen.

- that christianisation in Switzerland started already in the 4th century? Recently, when renovating the church in Martigny in the Valais, the foundations and floor of a large Romanic church, a Roman villa, and many gravesites were found. All indications point to the church having been that of the bishop Tehodul of Octodurus, first mentioned in documents of the year 381. When the excavations are completed the remains of the early church will be partly open to the public.
