A Bit of Virtually Unknown Pittsburgh History

Colonel Henry Lousis Bouquet

Few people today are aware that the Swiss were responsible for the final settlement of southwestern Pennsylvania.

Up until 1750, this region was largely uninhabited. Thick dark forests covered the landscape and even the Indians rarely traversed the region, keeping their trails and camps along the rivers and streams.

In 1750 an Indian guide, Christopher Gist, came to this area. He finally settled in Fayette County. His arrival slowly led to a steady influx of settlers from eastern Pennsylvania and Virginia. The land, however, belonged to the Indians and the attempted settlements led to brutal conflicts.

In 1719, in Rolle (Canton Vaud), Switzerland, Henry Louis Bouquet was born. He was the oldest of seven brothers. In 1736 he entered the service of Holland: in 1748 he entered the Swiss Guards and in 1754 he accepted a command in the British Army and was sent to Pennsylvania to quell the Indian uprisings. He, along with Colonel Frederick Haldiman, also Swiss, and other Swiss and German settlers, commanded the Royal Americans, who were composed of four battalions of one thousand men each.

Bouquet arrived in America in 1754 and in 1758 he cut a road from Carlisle to Fort Duquesne. He distinguished himself under General Forbes and was one of his chief advisors. More readily than any foreign officer of his day, Bouquet learned the best methods of fighting the American Indians. Few, if any, soldiers in our history have equaled him in this method of warfare.

The officers and men of this Royal American regiment had been engaged in the rough and lonely service of the frontiers and forests and when the Indian war broke out it was chiefly they who held the detached outposts of the west. By the spring of 1763, the Americans had not gotten the upper hand with the Indians and the Indians besieged Fort Pitt, which was under the command of another Swiss, Captain Simeon Ecuyer, who was wounded in the conflict.

Ecuyer managed to get a message to Bouquet, who was at Fort Ligonier. Bouquet prepared to march to Fort Pitt on August 5th with a bedraggled and exhausted army. He was met by the Indians at Bushy Run (now Harrison City) and the most decisive battle in American history began. With amazing skill and bravery, Bouquet and his little army defeated the Indians, thereby clearing the way for the march of civilization to the west. Twenty-five days later Bouquet arrived and re-captured Fort Pitt. The rest is history.

In 1765 the King of England promoted Bouquet to the rank of Brigadier General and placed him in command of the southern colonies. While in this service, Bouquet contracted yellow fever and died at Pensacola, Florida on September 2, 1765. His grave is unmarked and unknown.

Postscript: The Royal Americans disbanded after the Battle of Bushy Run. Some continued, Haldiman included, to Florida with Bouquet. Some returned to Europe: many others remained to settle the area of the Ligonier Valley, where today one can recognize the names of the descendants of these remarkable men. Also today you can find Bouquet Street in the Oakland area of Pittsburgh crossing Forbes Avenue.
