Dear Harry,

Last Sunday in Altoona Ostertag came to me to tell me that he had an option on Syria Mosque for the 1971 Saengerfest and paid down a certain amount to bind the contract. I tried to explain to him that they had no proper organization to undertake such a tremendous job, explaining all the difficulties, but he would not listen, saying that they would manage, giving only a smiling answer to my arguments and explanations.

I was very much perturbed and disgusted with his attitude and since then I have been thinking and worrying a lot about this matter, primarily because the good name of the Swiss in Pittsburgh and our reputation is involved. Convinced that something must be done without delay I wrote down my reasons why I think this Saengerfest project must be stopped before it is gone too far.

Enclosed you will find my "dissertation" giving all my reasons for my negative attitude.

I believe the best thing would be to have a meeting with these Ostertag people, at which I would gladly give further explanations.

However I leave that to you and the other officers. I shall be glad to hear from you in the near future.

To whom it may concern:

From the official report on the Swiss-American Saengerfest in Canton, Ohio, last June I was shocked to perceive that at the final meeting of the Delegates of the participating Societies it was resolved that the next Saengerfest in 1971 will be held in Pittsburgh. I immediately got in touch with the officers and leading members of the Swiss-American Society of Pittsburgh, the only still remaining Swiss organization properly functioning under a charter granted by the local Courts, with duly elected Officers under the constitution and by-laws. The Swiss-American Society was organized in 1964 and chartered in 1966.

The consensus of opinion of this society is:

1. That the Swiss-American Society of Pittsburgh, which is representing the majority of the Swiss of Western Pennsylvania, has no intention and no desire to either participate or to assist in the organization and the carrying through of a Saengerfest in Pittsburgh, for many reasons:

(a) The "Helvetia Maennerchor of Allegheny City, Pa.", as it was chartered in the 1880ies, and which flourished for many decades as a prominent singing society, participating at the first Saengerfest of the Swiss-American Singing Alliance in Cleveland in 1897, and thereupon at most of the succeeding Singing Festivals, reaching the pinnacle at the 1907 Saengerfest in Canton, where we had 57 active singers, all of whom were Swiss. Under the direction of Hans Zwicky from Glarus, who at the time was a prominent local organist and a member of the Pittsburgh Symphony Orchestra, where in Canton we easily won the first prize. As an outstanding chorus we sang an extra selection at the Grand Concert.

Below are extracts rebuffed on the same subject from
so many of my counsellors:

In 1939 the turn came to Pittsburgh to take over and carry through the 16th Saengerfest of the Alliance. At that time we had spacious headquarters and adequate social rooms on the North Side, where the visiting singers could be properly entertained. For the Concerts and Prize singing the City Authorities gave us permission to use the Auditorium of the North Side Carnegie Library. The Director of the Helvetia Maennerchor, Hans Glomb, acted as Festal Director.

(b) In the thirty years past since the conditions have completely changed. The Society lost its Hall and meeting quarters, mostly through mismanagement and constantly increased rentals for its quarters. As a result the owners of the building on Ohio Street practically evicted the society and all its activities ceased to function. Therefore the Helvetia Maennerchor must be considered as defunct, having lost its charter by default.

How a few Swiss singers managed to get together a choral group of a dozen or so singers in order to participate under the name of the defunct Helvetia Maennerchor of Pittsburgh at several of the last few Saengerfests is for some one else to explain. I, for one do not know.

Under these deplorable conditions these very few Swiss have offered in Canton to take over, organize and carry through the next Saengerfest in 1971 in Pittsburgh. How that is possible without the voluntary and enthusiastic co-operation of the whole Swiss Colony of Western Pennsylvania is for them to explain. There is no lawful organization, ^{are} there to my knowledge no funds to start the ball rolling, no authorized officers etc. etc..... Most important is the legal aspect; these few men cannot lawfully enter into an agreement or contract with the owners of Concert

Halls and Hotels, or any other corporation. It is absolutely necessary that they get an opinion on that point from an Attorney, especially as to their own personal liability.

I therefore suggest that the foregoing ex/planations be brought to the attention of the interested parties.

It is with great regret that due to other committments within my business neither Diane nor I will be able to join all of you on this occasion, nevertheless I wish to comment on one part of your questionnaire.
