

To all Swiss Clubs and Societies in the United States:

The "Amerikanische Schweizer Zeitung," now in its 103rd year, has gone thru some changes in management and editorium in the past few months. An Executive Committee has been formed and Max E. Ammann has joined the paper as Executive Editor to work in collaboration with our Senior Editor, Franz X. Amrein.

Our aim is to make the ASZ even more valuable to the Swiss compatriots residing in the United States. One of the ways is to bring them in closer contact with the many Swiss Clubs, Societies and Associations which exist in this country. We hope that the ASZ will more than ever be a link between the Swiss community and the various Swiss Clubs, and to achieve that, we have developed a threefold program of action:

- 1) We would like to update our "Vereins"-Directory, now appearing on page 6 of the ASZ.
- 2) We want to list regularly all important events of the Swiss community, with details provided by the various Swiss Clubs in the U.S.
- 3) We welcome and will print any kind of report of activities by the various Swiss Clubs, Societies and Associations in the U.S.

Here is what you can do:

- a) Supply the following information soonest possible:

- Name and address of the Club, Society or Association
- Meeting place
- Name of the President and/or contact
- Telephone number

We propose to keep the "Vereins"-Directory basically in the same form, with the exception that each Club, Society and Association would be given equal space and the same basic facts will be provided. We allocate in the ASZ 1 inch of space (1 column) for each Club, Society or Association to list the above data.

The yearly fee for this listing would be \$20.00.


Of course, if a Club wishes to use more space, we will charge for the additional space at our regular advertising rate, i.e. if published weekly 18¢ per line (approx. 14 lines an inch), which comes to \$2.52 a week or approx. \$130.00 a year per inch. (Rate schedule enclosed.)

- b) Let us have any additions or corrections to the 1971 program of activities of all Swiss Clubs in the New York Consular District for the full year, as it has been provided by the various Swiss Clubs to the Consulate General of Switzerland in New York, which appeared in the Jan. 6, 1971 issue. We contemplate printing every week the program of the next 4 weeks ahead.
- c) Mail to us manuscripts, written in English, not too long and written in a not too personal way; also pictures are welcome. We are willing to publish any kind of news concerning the activities of the various Swiss Clubs.

We need your help to reach our goal and are counting on your cooperation.

January 30, 1971

The first meeting of the new Board members of the Swiss American Society of Pittsburgh was called to order by newly elected President Heinz Gonser at the home of John Fankhauser Jr.

Members present were Heinz Gonser, John Fankhauser Jr. Trudy Kuenzi, Gloria Sutter, Hans Leuenberger and Arthur Rudolf.

Minutes of the December 12th, 1970 meeting were partially read and corrected and a resume of the Special Board Meeting of December 22, 1970 was given and approved.

The Treasurer reported a balance of \$3103.50. A checking account was discussed and a motion was made by Hans Leuenberger to start a checking account with a minimum of \$700. This motion was seconded by Arthur Rudolf and carried.

A motion was made by John Fankhauser Jr. to have the Saving and Checking account with Union National Bank & Trust Co. and to accept the resolution necessary to transfer our funds with 2 of 3 signatures of Heinz Gonser, President, Trudy Kuenzi, Secretary and Gloria Sutter, Treasurer. They are also authorized to sign new resolutions and signature cards. This was unanimously passed.

The report of the reception of the Ambassador was given by Trudy Kuenzi. The affair was \$518.28 and a total of \$364.75 was turned over to the Treasurer. It was unanimously approved to pay all bills. 91 were present at the Reception.

The Program for the year was discussed and approved as follows:

Ski Trip in February

May 23 - Trip to Dover and Dinner at Atwood Lodge

June 26 - Sangerfest - Hans Leuenberger made a motion to give \$50 for an ad for the Sangerfest Program Book. John Fankhauser Jr. second the motion and it was carried. It was brought up to have a Committee to represent us at their meeting to get details for the events of the Sangerfest for our Group. The President, Heinz Gonser along with Walter Heer and Harry Jacob were suggested to this committee.

August 1st - Swiss Picnic at Rose Grove, North Park

September 3-6 - Trip to New Glarus

December 4 - Christmas Dinner Meeting

Correspondence was read in regards to the Amerikanische Schweizer Zeitung. A motion was made by Hans Leuenberger to obtain a \$20.00 ad for a one inch space in this paper to advertise our group this year. John Fankhauser Jr. second the motion and it was carried. Contacts will be the President, Secretary and Treasurer.

Their being no further Business the meeting was declared adjourned.

President Heinz Gonser called the Board meeting of the Swiss-American Society of Pittsburgh to order at the home of Hans Leuenberger.

Members present were as follows: Heinz Gonser, John Fankhauser, Jr. Trudy Kuenzi, Gloria Sutter, Florence Cappe, F. Burke Sheeran, Arthur Rudolf, Hans Leuenberger, Fred Jossi Jr. and René Nigg.

The minutes of the January 30 meeting were read and approved.

The Treasurer reported on our new accounts and it was discussed. A motion was made by Florence Cappe to have Gloria Sutter, Treasurer sign all checks in the checking and savings account. The motion was seconded by F. Burke Sheeran and carried.

Heinz Gonser explained his status in his job transfer and what he could do for our organization if he remained as President. It was unanimously approved that he remain as President for at least one (1) year.

Correspondence was read as follows: A letter of thanks to our President by Ambassador Pierre Henri Aubaret.

Also a letter from Aulandschweizersekretariat to Rene Nigg pertaining to subscriptions to certain Swiss papers as a group at a discount.

The Sängerfest was discussed. René Nigg reported that there will be a Boat Ride and Reception and tour of the City on Friday night, the concert on Saturday night at the Syria Mosque and closing with a banquet on Sunday at noon. The concert tickets will be \$3 for reserved seats, #2 for general admission and \$1 student tickets. The committee of the Sangerfest also requested a membership list. We discussed attending the concert as a group but it was dropped and a motion was made by John Fankhauser Jr. that whoever desires a list of our membership in the Sängerfest we will send it and put our whole hearted support to attending the concert. F. Burke Sheeran second the motion and it was unanimously carried.

René Nigg will send the Secretary the name and address to where the membership list should be sent and she will send a letter with same asking that this list not be used for any other purpose than to contact members on events of the coming Sangerfest.

Under Old Business, Trudy Kuenzi will send the \$20.00 check to "Amerikanische Schweizer Zeitung" for the ad in this paper along with list of information desired and events for the year. The Secretary will be the contact for the paper.

Due to weather conditions, the ski outing was not organized. Ice Skating was mentioned and dropped.

Also notices of Delinquent payment of dues will be enclosed with those members who are delinquent for 1971.

René Nigg requests everyone to turn in any names of companies using the Swiss emblem for commercial purposes as this is unlawful. He received a letter to this effect.

The meeting was adjourned by Hans Leuenberger, seconded by F. Burke Sheeran and carried.

There will be no games this year but treats would be made up in bags for the children consisting of Pretzels, cracker Jacks and Bubble Gum.

The trip to New Glarus over Labor Day was discussed. Arthur Rudolf will take care of chartering the bus. It is preferred to leave at 9:00 P.M. from the Greyhound Station. Florence Cappe is in charge of obtaining lodging. The Alphorn Motel if available would be the best for lodging our group. This was the same place we had last year.



NEW GLARUS

In 1845 the Emigration Society of the Canton of Glarus, Switzerland, sent Nicholas Duerst and Fridolin Streiff to the United States to purchase land for a Swiss settlement. They were joined in August by 108 settlers who began their homesteads on 1,280 acres of farm and timber land bordering the Little Sugar River. The first years were hard and it was not until April 1850 that the town was organized. Then New Glarus began to prosper: in 1851 the first store opened, in 1853 the first hotel and in 1870 the first cheese factory. By 1892, the population had increased to 600. The culture of Old Glarus has not been forgotten: the Swiss-German dialect is still spoken and the traditional holidays are observed.






