Over the past years a situation has been developing in the Swiss community of Pittsburgh which recently has resulted in a frank confrontation. It seems urgent to analyze the developments which brought on the present impasse and then to search for an amicable solution. This will require give and take from all concerned.

For many years the Swiss-American Society of Pittsburgh, under the vigorous leadership of Florence Cappe has been the sole organized group in town that concerned itself with Swiss affairs. The activities of this Society consist in organizing a picnic commemorating Swiss Independence day and a Christmas dinner held at Cranberry Hall. Occasionally the Society has organized trips to New Glarus or to festivals of Swiss clubs in other states or towns. Recently the membership has shown little interest in the latter affairs.

The Swiss-American Society has, for many years, been unable to recruit first generation Swiss living in or around Pittsburgh. These compatriots have shown little interest in joining presumably because of a total lack of interesting and patriotic programs. Under Article II of the constitution of the Swiss-American Society one reads that it is the purpose of the Society to "Acquaint Swiss and Americans with the scientific and cultural life and achievements of both nations as an aid to good relationship and understanding between their people." It is stated further "in order to achieve the foregoing general aims, the Society shall undertake activities such as social gatherings, reception and entertainment of Swiss visitors, newcomers and friends of Switzerland; an August 1st celebration; lectures and discussions; musical and athletic events; meetings of professional and scientific groups and similar activities." These are noble aims indeed; however, during the last 10 years they have not been pursued.

The reasons for this may well reside in the management of the Society. Under the tight control of Florence Cappe, a small group of loyal followers have found a way to be re-elected to office year after year and "outsiders" who may have brought new ideas and a different style were carefully excluded. Two recent exceptions to this, Oswald Wyler and Heinz Kunz, are first generation Swiss who joined the Society and each served as vice president and then president. Their efforts to bring about change, however, have been frustrated by the board of directors and as the result of unpleasant confrontations, Heinz Kunz has resigned his presidency. This is a most unhealthy development which will add significantly to the polarization amongst the Swiss community at large and the Society.

During the last few years a number of first generation Swiss and their American friends have established contact and have come together to celebrate the 1st of August in the spirit of Switzerland with Swiss food, Swiss music and conversation in their native languages. This group, at the present time, numbers approximately 50 people and they are adamant in their desire to establish a truly representative Swiss Society. This course of action has been discussed for some time and there is considerable interest to move in the direction of establishing a Swiss organization independent of the Swiss-American

Society. Such a move would split the Swiss into two camps and would further add to the present unhealthy climate.

As compromise is usually the best way to solve problems such as the one that exists today, we the undersigned would be pleased to entertain discussions on this subject with the officers of the Swiss-American Society to come to a mutually satisfactory conclusion. Should such a course of action fail to resolve the problem, it seems highly likely that a competing Swiss organization will be formed.


It was reported that a \$50.00 ad money had been sent to the Swiss-American Society of Milwaukee for an ad in the Festival booklet.


