SWITZERLAND'S 700th ANNIVERSARY CELEBRATION

In the summer of 1291 the alpine communities of Schwyz, Uri and Unterwalden met near Lake Lucerne. The Swiss mountain peasants formed a league and swore eternal fidelity, refusing to accept any judge or law not their own. This was the beginning of the roots of federalism and democracy in the small but unique country of Switzerland. Since then descendants of this alpine country meet to commemorate Switzerland's National Day of Independence.

Pittsburgh and Allegheny County Officials, recognizing the enormous significance of this achievement have joined in the international tribute to Switzerland. To honor the 700th Anniversary of Switzerland's Independence, Sophie Masloff Mayor of the City of Pittsburgh has signed a proclamation designating August 1st to August 8th 1991 as Swiss Week in the city. The week of August 1st to August 8th 1991 has also been proclaimed Swiss Week in Allegheny County by Commissioners Tom Foerster, Pete Flaherty and Lawrence W. Dunn.

Earlier this year the United States Postal Service issued a 50¢ commemorative stamp featuring the U. S. Capitol Building and Switzerland's Parliament Building, in recognition of the common values of democracy, freedom and federalism shared by the United States and the Swiss Confederation.

The Swiss-American Society will gather together on Sunday, August 4, 1991 at Parish Hill Dance Hall, North Park to celebrate this important event. Ambassador Hans-Peter Erismann from the Consulate General in New York, and his wife Freda will be the guests of honor. During the picnic, Ambassador Erismann will announce the appointment of Dr. Heinz W. Kunz as Honorary Consul of Switzerland in Pittsburgh. Dr. Kunz lives in Pittsburgh with his wife Nancy and is a Professor at the University of Pittsburgh.

Adding color to the festivities will be the yodelling and songs by the Helvetia Maennerchor. Games, prizes, a bountiful tombola table, dancing to the music of Ed Hrabel's Band and genuine Swiss camaraderie will round out the day.

Mt. Kearsarge is in the Winslow State Park in South/Central New Hampshire. The hike (northside trail) is 1.0 mile long and should take approximately one hour to the top. The trail is much used, wide, well cleared and marked with red dots. The Swiss segment of the Swiss/New England Exchange on Conserving Hillside Farming was very successful. Twenty Vermont and New Hampshire farmers and others working in related areas visited Switzerland for 12 days in late August. The group visited farms, alps, cheese-making operations, agricultural schools, as well as planning and tourism agencies in the Cantons of Valais, Vaud, Neuchatel, Lucerne and Graubunden. The tour included a walk to a Swiss Alpine Club hut in the mountains above Pontresina, and ended with the annual conference of the Swiss Group for the Mountain Regions in Tarasp. On several occasions, the New England participants gave presentations on agriculture in their region.

Participants discussed with their Swiss counterparts such issues as farm subsidies, zoning for agriculture, and the relationship between tourism and farming. All members of the group were impressed with how much they learned, with the clear commitment Switzerland has made to its hill and mountain farms, and with the outstanding hospitality shown by the Swiss. The participants have decided to keep the New England group together in order to take the best ideas from the trip and adapt them to policies and practices in Vermont and New Hampshire. 

In the Spring of this year representatives of eight Swiss organizations, located mainly in the eastern U.S., met for the first time to exchange information on their benevolent activities. The purpose of this meeting, held at the Swiss Embassy in Washington, D.C., was to improve service to Swiss in need and learn from each other ways of doing this. Topics of discussion included services provided to elderly Swiss to help them socialize with their peers and scholarship programs. The open exchange of ideas provided many insights.



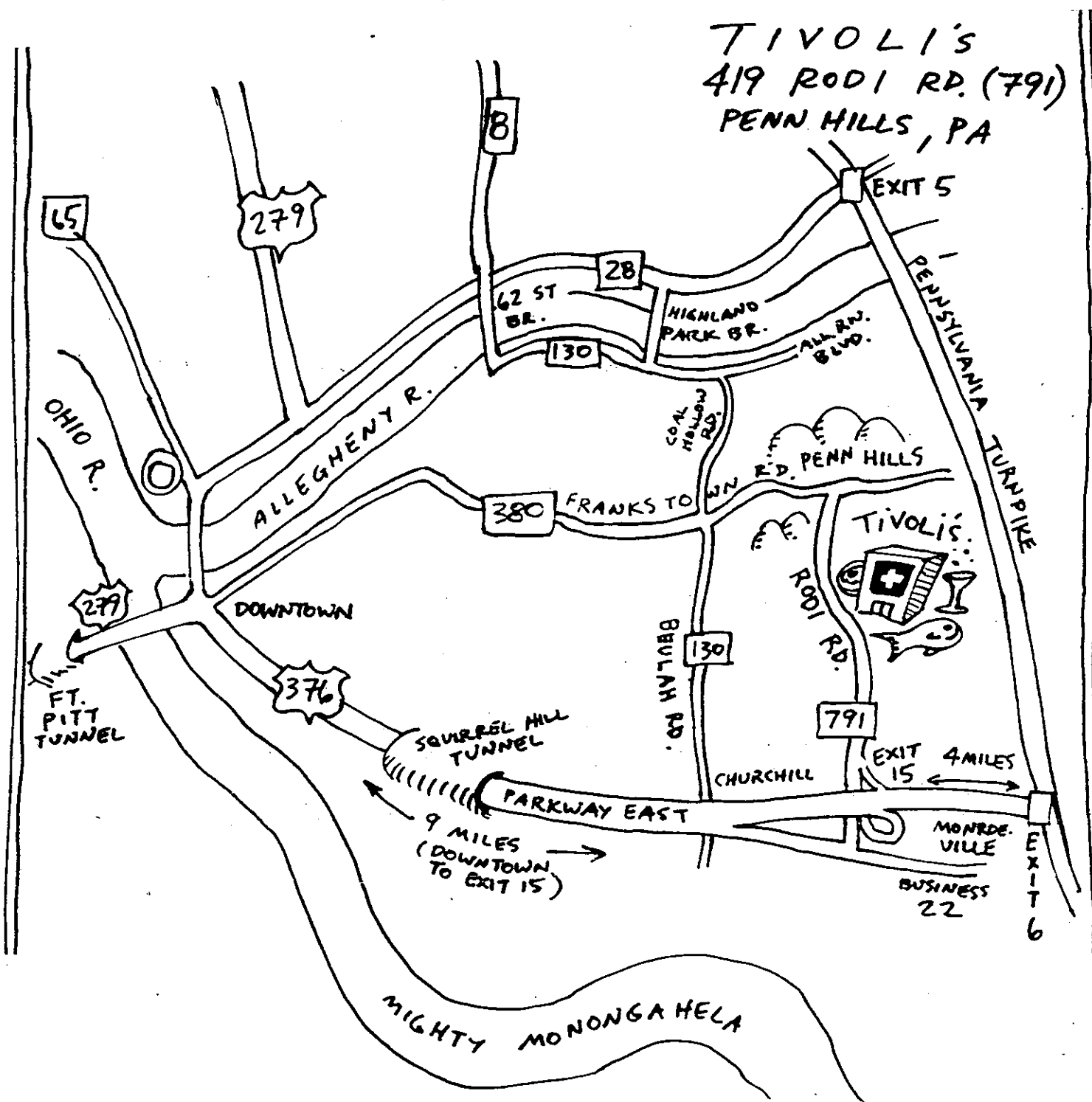

SWISS ART

A 700th BIRTHDAY CELEBRATION

When, toward the end of the nineteenth century, Ferdinand Hodler gave pictorial form to the psychological impact of the alpine landscape and its inhabitants, a style that was recognized as Swiss came into being. The power and originality of this imagery was matched at the time by the use of bold, expressive color and an enlivened surface texture, introduced into Switzerland by Cuno Amiet, who had just returned from thirteen months in Brittany, where he had worked among the painters of the Gauguin circle. During the first two decades of our century, Hodler and Amiet influenced each other, and the search for an amalgam of the styles and technical peculiarities of these two masters became common practice among Swiss painters. In a way, this fusion of Hodler's revival of certain German old-master characteristics of draftsmanship and design with Amiet's adaptation of the French Post-impressionists' use of color might well be viewed as unusually appropriate in a country that is itself a successful amalgam of diverse cultural and linguistic groups.

Inevitably, the art of Switzerland, while related to that of its neighbors on all sides, has had an eccentric character, and its history has been marked by the appearance of some very strong, highly idiosyncratic personalities, from Urs Graf and Niklaus Manuel, Füssli (Fuseli), Liotard, R. Töpffer, Böcklin and Welte to Klee, Trachsel, Itten, Alberto Giacometti and Meret Oppenheim, whose fur-lined teacup has become the icon par excellence of surrealism. With the recent death of Jean Tinguely, Switzerland and the world have lost a remarkable personality, whose seriocomic visions of heaven and hell, materialized through the turnings, tappings, rumblings, and squealings of mechanized fragments, will accompany us into Switzerland's next seven hundred years. Tinguely's art seems entirely *sui generis* on the one hand, a descendant of Klee's "Twittering Machine" on the other.

The Pennsylvania State University is pleased to celebrate Switzerland's achievement (a case of *ars longa et vita longa*) with an exhibition that is modest but original and refreshing. The heart of the exhibition consists of the collection of a Bernese family that has had close ties to a number of the artists over four generations. Consequently, the collection, which covers the century 1891-1991, has a special, intimate character. The resulting emphasis on Bernese artists is, in fact, appropriate since the nation's capital is this year celebrating an anniversary too, the 800th of its founding by the Duke of Zähringen in 1191.

This collection, however, has been supplemented, and its scope expanded, by works from the University's holdings and through the generosity of other lenders, to whom we express our sincere gratitude. The visitor will thus have the opportunity to enjoy the work of some well-known figures of the past and present, as well as to discover a number of excellent regional artists who are less familiar outside of Switzerland.

At the Zoller Gallery a group of posters of distinguished design, an art form in which Switzerland's leadership has long been recognized, is on display. Among these is a set created for Swissair. The airline, established in 1931, provides yet another anniversary to celebrate—its 60th. Switzerland's equally fine reputation for book illustration, particularly of children's books, may be appreciated in the Rare Books Room of Pattee Library.

I wish to express my gratitude to those who have not only made this exhibition possible but have done so with enthusiasm and inventiveness. Dr. Kahren Arbitman, Director of the Palmer Museum of Art, and her staff have done everything possible to install the exhibition effectively, despite the prodigious obstacles created by the construction activity of the Museum's expansion. Special thanks to Ron Hand, who managed the presentation with such clarity and order. Professors James Stephenson, head of the School of Visual Arts, and Lanny Sommese were most cooperative in making the Zoller Gallery available for the poster show, where Cindy Morrison was in charge of hanging. Charles Mann, head of rare books and special collections at Pattee Library, kindly provided space for the book exhibition, which was artfully arranged by Sandra Stelts. Once again we are indebted to James Moeser, Dean of the College of Arts and Architecture, for his generosity.
