


Dear Doctor Lyon:

I was pleased to receive your correspondence of February 20, 1997. It was discussed at our regular board meeting of the Swiss American Society of Pittsburgh. We share your concerns with the current attacks on Switzerland for many of the same reasons you stated.

As a Swiss social and cultural organization, the board did not feel that expressing political views was within our principles or charter. Sharing of information and views is certainly within our rights as private citizens and our directors indicated they would respond as private citizens to articles published locally.

We thank you for your initiative in organizing the World Swiss Congress. It is gratifying to know there are others who share our common heritage and concerns. Unfortunately, Swiss ethnic organizations seem to have no central clearing house for information. I am enclosing copies of our newsletter which I would encourage you to pass on to individuals or organizations. Awareness of groups sharing of ideas may serve to strengthen Swiss organizations in North America as well as ties to Switzerland. If you would forward addresses of Swiss organizations you

have acquired (we would like to contact them before the North American Swiss Singer Alliance Festival in July) we would be pleased.

The Swiss American Society of Pittsburgh is about 30 years old. Our members include native Swiss and descendants and friends thereof. The Society was organized after the last of three traditional ethnic clubs of the 1920's in the Pittsburgh area closed. Currently we have about 180 adult members. To fax information you may use the number of our secretary, Nancy Carlson, 412 856 0983.

On a personal note, I am a second generation of Swiss descent with all four of my grandparents having come from Switzerland in the 1920's. I look forward to hearing from you and am confident that Switzerland's legacy of sound ethical business practices will not allow any shadow of controversy to linger.

As you know, the Schweizer Helvetia Maennerchor of Pittsburgh, also known as the Pittsburgh Swiss Singers, will be hosting the 35th North American Swiss Singing Alliance Festival in July, 1997. This Festival will be celebrating the 100th Anniversary of the Alliance.

The Festival will be held on July 18, 19 and 20, 1997, at the Seven Springs Mountain Resort, in Champion, PA [approximately 65 miles from Pittsburgh].

Several members of your Society have requested information from us regarding the Festival, so we thought we would share the information with all of you.

For those who might be interested in the entire weekend's festivities, the prices for the Festival package are as follows:

\$265.00 per person, single occupancy
\$214.00 per person, double occupancy
\$192.00 per person, triple/quad occupancy

The package includes: Friday and Saturday night lodging, tax on lodging, Friday evening Bar B Cue and bon fire, Saturday Buffet Breakfast, Buffet Dinner and Evening Post Concert Reception and Dance, plus Sunday Brunch. It also includes all tax and gratuities for food service. There will be cash bars at all dinners, reception and dance.

Children ages 17 and younger lodge complimentary when staying in the same room with parents. Children's meals will be an additional cost.

Those who purchase the package, would also need to purchase a \$50.00 Fest Card. This card serves as your admission to all the singing performances, a festival souvenir pin and a souvenir book.

For those who would care to attend the Saturday festivities only, there is a one day ticket for \$50.00. This ticket naturally does not include any type of lodging. It does include your admission to the prize singing and the grand concert; plus the Saturday buffet dinner and post concert reception.

SWISS FALL OHIO OUTINGS -- A FEW IDEAS

Jane and I recently stayed in Ohio overnite one May weekend

Adjoining Tuscarawas and Holmes County bring extensive Swiss and Amish communities together in close proximity for dual travel enjoyments.

Sugarcreek, Dover, New Philadelphia and Baltic adjoin Wilmot, Berlin, Kidron, Mt. Hope, Walnut Creek and Charm to offer insights into Swiss life and also an Amish community larger then that in Lancaster, PA.

Whether September or October, with fall colors coming forth, perhaps a few or many Swissers would relish an overnighter to nearby scenic Ohio.

Travel time is 2.5-3 hours depending on routes chosen. Rather then a bus I propose using a few vans or autos of members to provide choices:

- Go Friday and return Sunday or go Saturday and return Sunday
- Shared ride costs at \$5 one way for non-drivers to join in, with
- Flex option: Drive out with one and return with another
- Or, Make just a DAY trip - on Friday, Saturday or Sunday.

- Lodging at multiple Beds and Breakfasts as space available, PLUS
- Multiple choices for places and events to see, shop and eat !

Sept 29, 30 Ohio Swiss Festival in Sugarcreek -

Sept 16, 23, 30 Apple Butter Stirring at Yoder's Amish Home Walnut Creek
Oct 7, 8 Homes County Antique Festival and Apple Dumpling Festival

Just west of Charm is Guggisberg Cheese, Guggisberg Swiss Inn and Chalet in the Valley Restaurant, where we might all gather for one meal.

I have a listing of several Bed and Breakfasts that I can contact, but do suggest common lodging (ASAP reserved) at Guggisberg Swiss Inn, with specified nites and deposits paid in by July 29 at latest. They can do two, three or four per room with two double beds, superb/spacious, at \$70/\$80 for two to \$85/\$95 for four, plus tax, per nite. Will arrange group rates at Inn and Chalet Valley for a Fri/Sun meal if so desired.

IF dates are agreed upon and drivers/open seats available are identified then I'll coordinate lodging and reservations on paid deposits basis and match up any persons needing travel arrangements on their dates.

Some other places to see (but not on Sundays) are: LEHMAN HARDWARE at Kidron (prefer over Mt. Hope), ALPENSTOCK and WOODEN TOY SHOP (etc) in Wilmot, WHITMER'S STORE in Winesburg and YANKEE WORKSHOP in Berlin.

CHEESES: also at HEINI'S (1m ne of Berlin) and WALNUT CREEK CHEESE !!

EATS: AMISH DOOR RESTAURANT in Wilmot. DER DUTCHMAN of WALNUT CREEK, Mrs. YODER'S KITCHEN in Mt. Hope, and MILLER'S DUTCH KITCHEN of Baltic for good 'AMISH' food, ..but also not open on Sundays.

Dear Mr. Kuenzi:

The purpose of my letter to you is an informal request as a private citizen of Swiss extraction to solicit your organisation's expression of support for the newly formed Swiss World Congress, which I am gradually organising. The purpose of the Congress is initially:

1. to promote the land of our forefathers, their wonderful successes throughout their history in international business and finance, the sciences, arts, culture, humanism - and above all, their wonderfully sensible, democratic way of life;
2. to make us North Americans of Swiss extraction aware of potentially damaging attacks on Switzerland where we, as private citizens can help - and to formulate the kind of assistance that might be helpful; and
3. to react swiftly and collectively to press reports - good or bad -support journalists, publications and broadcasters traditionally friendly to Switzerland and let them know our views on a regular basis and challenge, or provide information to those who are particularly unfriendly to Switzerland - especially those who have ulterior commercial, financial, political, or economic motives and interests they seek to promote by attacking the land of our forefathers. If we let anyone poison our roots, our healthy and happy North American tree will die!

In essence, I would be in touch with you whenever major issues arise to explain, or seek explanations from you and discuss a possible form of relief or assistance. This would generally simply require a letter or some monitoring on your behalf. Secondly, whenever you see a local article or a radio/TV broadcast item about Switzerland - good or bad - I would ask you to take note of the publication, the writer or radio/TV broadcaster and have the members of your organisation contact him/her by whatever means is most convenient, congratulate them on their accuracy, or correct their views with sensible argument. Use your initiative and express your own feelings on the matter. As God has blessed us with prosperity and a great and happy past, this will rarely be needed, but one such dark cloud has come up right now.

This major current issue of concern to all of us North Americans of Swiss extraction is the unprecedented attack on us from some militant and vocal members of the Jewish community. Remember that these are not our Jewish friends whom we know and love, but some unsavoury dark elements that we perhaps encounter for the first time. The issue of Jewish gold that the Swiss have somehow hidden and will not release is of particular concern to me, because I am familiar with the issue, not only because the Swiss banking system was one of the first we had to study thoroughly during my MBA program in California, but more importantly because I worked at the headquarters of one of the major Swiss banks in Zurich and am familiar with the issue. I want to let you know that the Swiss numbered accounts were set up in the thirties when Nazi spies suddenly appeared in great numbers to try to extract information on Jewish accounts. The reason at the origin of these numbered accounts was the bankers' concern for their Jewish clients - and

any other interpretation is outright wrong, or highly suspect. Naturally, they rarely knew the religious affiliation of their clients, since an inborn respect for privacy would forbid them to ask where and how their clients worshipped.

I want to let you know, however, that privacy was not respected when it came to the business at hand. Whenever a client arrived to open any account, they had to tell us in writing where they got the funds. In no other country did I ever have to do that. Nobody at my bank who came to claim moneys of a deceased relative would ever have had any problems retrieving the funds. Naturally, their identity and their rightful claim to the money would have to be established.


The problem with the current Jewish claims is inexplicable to me, because the bank had a policy of returning foreign moneys that lay dormant in a certain account for an established number of years to the Government of the State of Origin. I believe most other Swiss banks have the same policy - generally after 50 years of dormancy. It is just about 50 years since the last world war and I can't help wondering if the current crisis was not triggered by the fact that governments are now beginning to receive such unclaimed funds. I also recall a lady who came to me at the Bank and confided to me that her relative had died in a Jewish concentration camp and had told her he had deposited money in Switzerland. She did not know which bank it was, or where in Switzerland the funds were deposited, nor what amount it was. We checked our records for the name she gave us and there had never been such an account. She had, of course, no death certificate, or any other documentation that would give her the right to claim any amount. Had there been any way we could have helped her, we would have. I believe this is what most other Swiss banks did as well. I have also worked for a Canadian bank and have had dealings with many international financial institutions in all parts of the world. Rarely do you encounter the same degree of client service and efficiency that I saw at the Bank in Zurich. That is why I find the issue so incomprehensible.

I would, therefore, like you and your members to write quietly to Senator D'Amato of New York to explain to him that you, as a North American citizen/resident of Swiss extraction, do not appreciate any unsubstantiated claims he is supporting. Urge him to be fair and allow for the facts to speak - not greed, or misguided emotions. His address is: Senator D'Amato, Senate Hart Office Building, Room 520, Washington, D.C. 20510 - or give him a quick call at (202) 224-6542. --- Do respond to any story in the media that gives you unsubstantiated claims of some wrongful financial dealings. They are most likely untrue. All it takes is a quick note to the writer, or broadcaster. Speak to your Jewish friends and reassure them that if any of them have any rightful claims, they could not possibly be ignored. Call radio stations and television stations that say the wrong things that hurt us all - and please do it today.

I have left Switzerland many years ago, yet to me - and no doubt to you too - she is one of the loveliest and happiest countries I know. Oh, do let us keep it that way - and do not let her doubt her own goodness - not even for a moment.

I thank you most cordially.



Bruce also reflected on the society's participation in the Saengerfest, and noted other issues the board had considered, such as the possibility of future efforts to establish a Swiss Nationality Room in the University of Pittsburgh's Cathedral of Learning.

chops" - Baked Kassler Ripchen.


It was the worst meal ever - I had
