President's Report

Switzerland traces its history back to the Bundesbrief signed in 1291 among Uri, Schwyz, and Unterwalden. Our Society, of course, cannot claim the same longevity; Pittsburgh, after all, was founded only in 1758--by which time the Swiss Confederation was more than 450 years old. In looking through the Society's archives, however, I was surprised to learn that there has been a formal organization of Swiss immigrants in Pittsburgh since at least 1903. That original group was called the United Swiss Brothers of East Pittsburgh and, at one time, was active and prosperous enough to purchase a headquarters at 1513 Electric Avenue that they proudly called the Schwyzer-Huusli.

It is not clear to me what happened to the United Swiss Brothers of East Pittsburgh or their headquarters (the original Schwyzer-Huusli burned to the ground and was replaced by a larger location on Fillmore Road). Nor is it clear to me how our Society succeeded the United Swiss Brothers of East Pittsburgh to represent Switzerland and its friends in the Pittsburgh region. What is clear to me is that organizations like ours persist only as long as there is the will behind them. And the Society has been blessed for many years to have an active group of volunteers whose love for Switzerland is expressed in the energy they devote to this organization.

As we come together once again to celebrate 1. August, I remember and thank those who came before me as President of the Society and have ensured that Swiss in Pittsburgh have a place to gather for more than 120 years.

I am a first generation Swiss on my father's side.

My father Josef was born in 1926 in Zeneggen, a small mountain village in Oberwallis. Being one of 14 and the oldest male, he was expected to leave as a teenager to work and send money back home to help the family financially for a while. Working in the hotel business, he worked many places throughout Switzerland; then England, Bermuda and Montreal. With the grand opening of the Pittsburgh Hilton in 1960, which was supposed to be just another stop in a world travel adventure, he met and fell in love with Maria Ammer a native Bavarian at the Teutonia Männerchor. They ultimately decided to remain in Pittsburgh, raising a family here.

Josef was very proud of his Swiss heritage and we were very fortunate to have made many trips to the homeland and to connect with our many relatives. Fortunately, his granddaughters enjoyed many years with their Opa and are very fond of their Swiss ancestry as well. They share his interest in cultures and a desire for world adventure. Hence, they live currently in Colorado, Florida, and Australia but have traveled to six of the seven continents already. Their goal is to visit all seven continents eventually.

Swiss Nationality Room at the University of Pittsburgh to Add Third Portrait to Back Wall-Albert Gallatin

The Swiss Nationality Room Committee, at the urging through recent years of former SNRC Treasurer Philip Bottonari and others, has agreed in principle and has received approval from the University of Pittsburgh to add a portrait of Albert Gallatin to the middle of the back wall of the Swiss Room.

The current Swiss Room back wall has portraits of the Swiss Johann Pestalozzi, the founder of modern educational philosophy for children and kindergarten, and the Swiss Jean-Jacques Rousseau, of Geneva, who upheld the rights of man and education for all. These portraits are drawn by illustrator and SNRC committee member Fred Carlson in the style of the famed Swiss portraitist Hans Holbein with the accompanying printing of the subjects' names that Holbein made famous. The framing for the two portraits was commissioned and paid for by our recently deceased former Chairman Dr. Heinz Kunz. The portraits have graced the back wall of the Swiss Room since the dedication in April 2012.


Recently, Fred had time to complete the proposed portrait of Gallatin and has identified framing to match the other frames used in the room from Boxheart Gallery in Bloomfield. Fred expects to be able to bring the framed drawing to the Swiss National Day picnic on August 2.

There has been a perfect space between the two existing portraits for doing this portrait of Gallatin. Gallatin was a Swiss from Geneva (b. 1760) who immigrated to the United States in 1780 and served the United States in numerous roles, his most important his role as Thomas Jefferson's Secretary of the Treasury with the negotiation the Louisiana Purchase from France. He also had property south of Pittsburgh in Friendship Hill, so there are lots of Swiss-American and western PA connections to Gallatin. His biography is

imposing and will be featured on a shelf in the display cases of the Swiss Room.

The Gallatin portrait's addition to the room will be featured in celebration of the NRIEP 100th anniversary Heritage functions during 2026, and the SNRC with the partnership of the NRIEP anticipates hosting a program on Gallatin's life in the fall of 2026.

Cooperatives in Valais

A cooperative is a working or ownership collective in which the members have rights and duties as set down in statutes and regulations. While members' duties include participating in the work of the cooperative and assuming official functions, their rights include the use of goods and facilities owned by the cooperative.

In Valais, cooperatives arose out of medieval farming guilds. For centuries, these cooperatives governed agricultural life in Valais with rules and regulations, in particular pertaining to the use of common goods such as water, forests and alpine pastures. The cooperatives were responsible for constructing and maintaining collective infrastructure such as water channels, roads, alpine machinery and ovens. In spite of today's changed environment, the cooperatives in Valais still fulfil important legal, economic, ecological and social functions.

A key issue for the cooperatives has always been the challenge of finding a balance between optimal use of resources and their sustainability. The joint administration and use of common goods helps to save on costs and strengthens cohesion among the members, reinforcing the sense of responsibility for the common good. These ecological and social functions give the cooperatives potential for the future.


